- Forgive one another (Matthew 6:12; Ephesians 4:32)

- Care for one another (Galatians 6:2; 1 Thessalonians 5:14-15)

 This is about picking up those who stumble and resting with those who are tired.
- Keep watch on each other (Matthew 18:12-15; Galatians 6:1)

 This is about calling strays back to the path and seeking out those who wander off.
- Submit to our leaders (1 Thessalonians 5:12; Hebrew 13:17)

 This is about having people who set the pace for us and ensure we are properly equipped for the journey.

This last two are related to church discipline and authority, which are topics that make people nervous. But ultimately, they are about knowing who's got your back, who's going to help you stay on track. When it comes to the crunch, surely you want to have a group of Christians who love you enough that they will support you and challenge you as they journey with you. That's what church membership is about.
